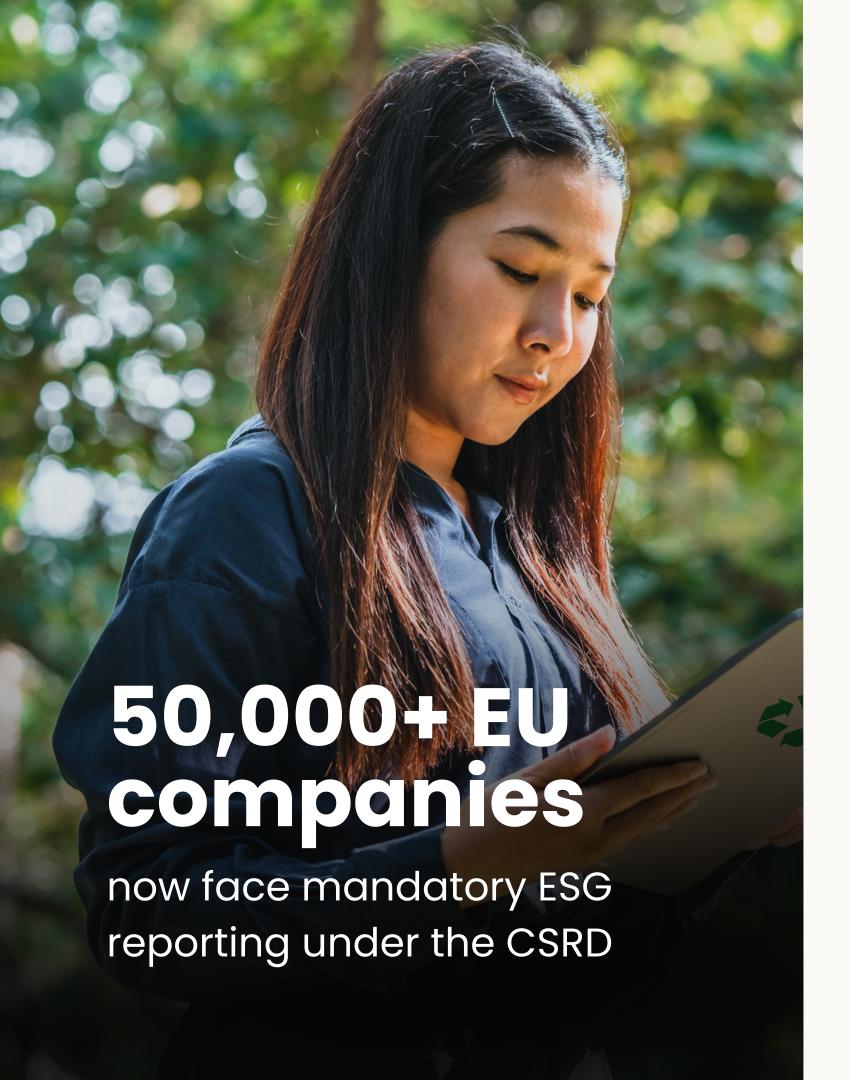

Over 50,000 companies are now subject to the EU's Corporate Sustainability Reporting Directive (CSRD), setting a new standard for transparency and accountability on environmental and impact.

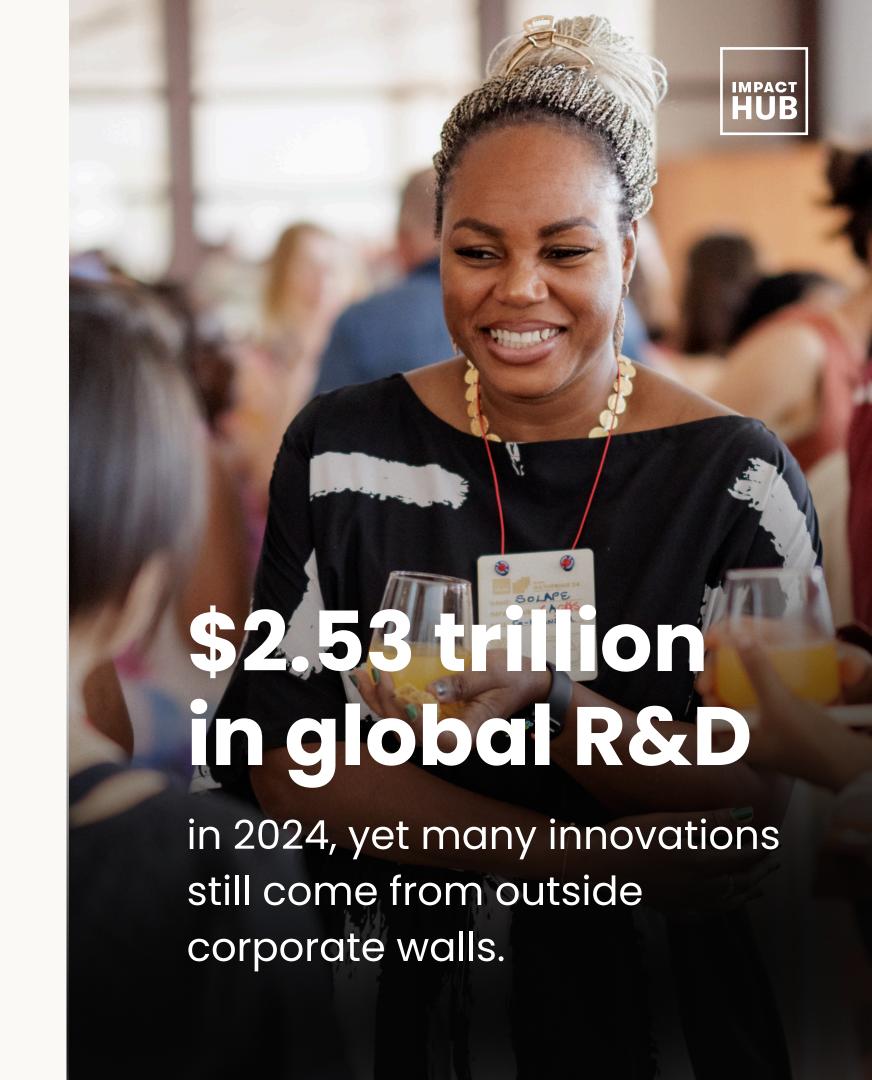
# Innovation moves beyond boardrooms

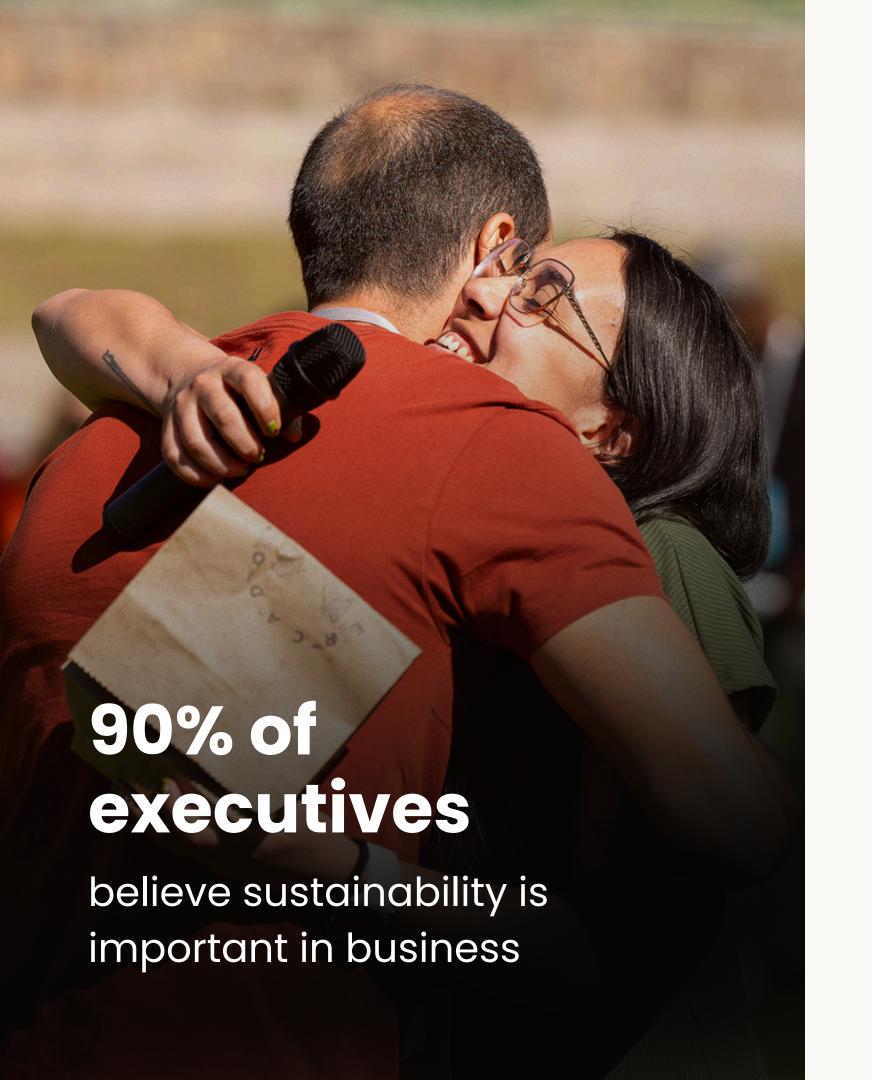
# Foundations serve as strategic bridges

## From pilots to procurement

Procurement is no longer just about cost control. Today, how companies buy—and from whom—is becoming a key driver of innovation, equity, and long-term value.

Across industries, social enterprises and diverse suppliers are outperforming traditional vendors in adaptability, cost-efficiency, and relevance. Their deep ties to communities and proximity to pressing challenges give them a sharper view of unmet needs and emerging opportunities.

Leading companies are moving beyond one-off pilots. They're embedding impact suppliers into their core supply chains through long-term, strategic partnerships.

The result? More resilient value chains, access to new markets and customer segments, and real progress on ESG and DEI commitments—not as a side initiative, but as a business advantage.

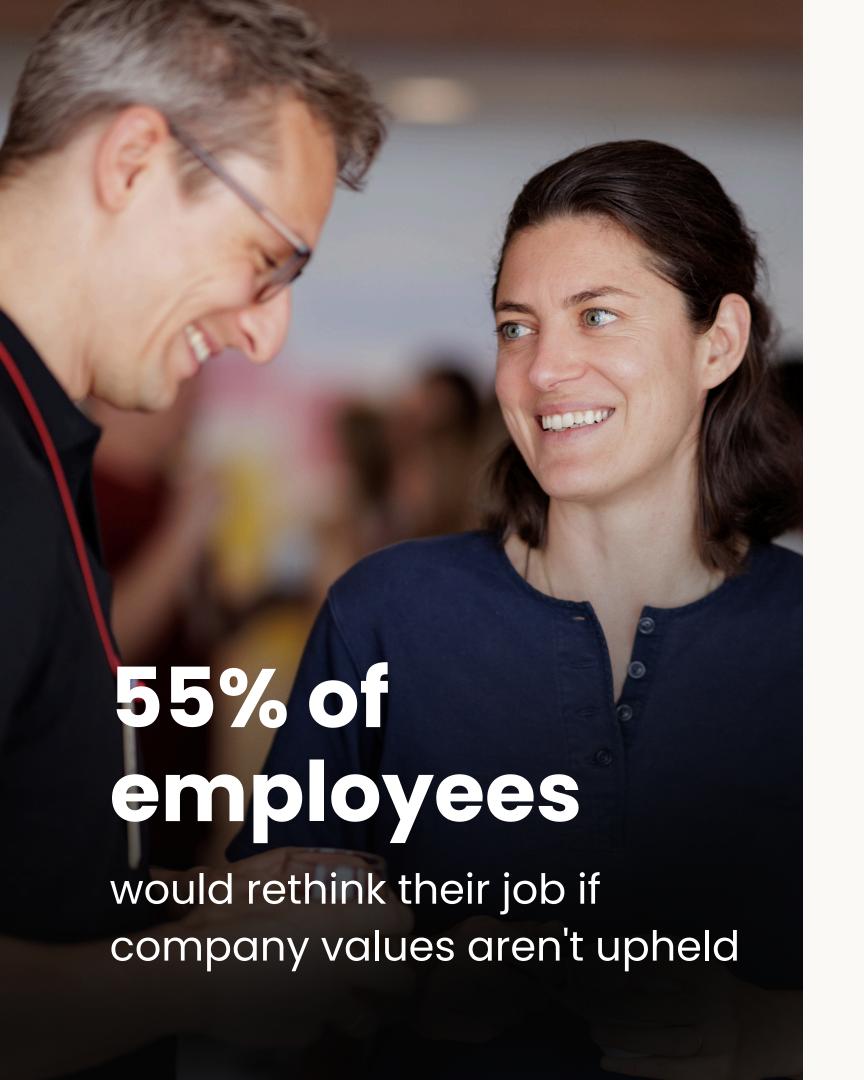
# The talent magnet effect

Recent research reveals that 55% of employees would reconsider their employment if their company failed to live up to its stated values, with top performers being among the most likely to leave.

Companies with genuine impact partnerships aren't just retaining employees. They're influencing who applies, who stays, and how people develop. These partnerships create a talent flywheel: purpose-driven work attracts high performers, meaningful projects build skills, and employees become ambassadors who draw in more top talent.

Employees gain exposure to entrepreneurial thinking, community insights, and fresh problem-solving approaches—experiences rarely found in traditional roles. This unlocks untapped talent pools, strengthens internal innovation, and builds a culture of purpose that sets companies apart.

When people can point to real change they've helped create, work becomes more than a job. It becomes a personal and professional growth platform that salary and benefits alone can't match.







In 2024, Bayer Foundation partnered with the Impact Hub Network to scale the Women Entrepreneurs Award, supporting 15 women-led ventures across Latin America, Africa & the Middle East, and Asia Pacific.

Focused on health and food security, the programme drew 2,276 applications—a 43% increase from the previous year—through local activations in 9 countries, 13 amplification partners and Impact Hubs global reach.

Winners received €25,000 and joined a six-month accelerator with mentorship, peer learning, and global visibility. Through powerful storytelling and strategic PR, the initiative reached over 5 million people globally, amplifying our collective impact.

This partnership demonstrates how aligning corporate goals with trusted, on-the-ground networks can unlock and scale inclusive innovation in critical impact sectors and regions.

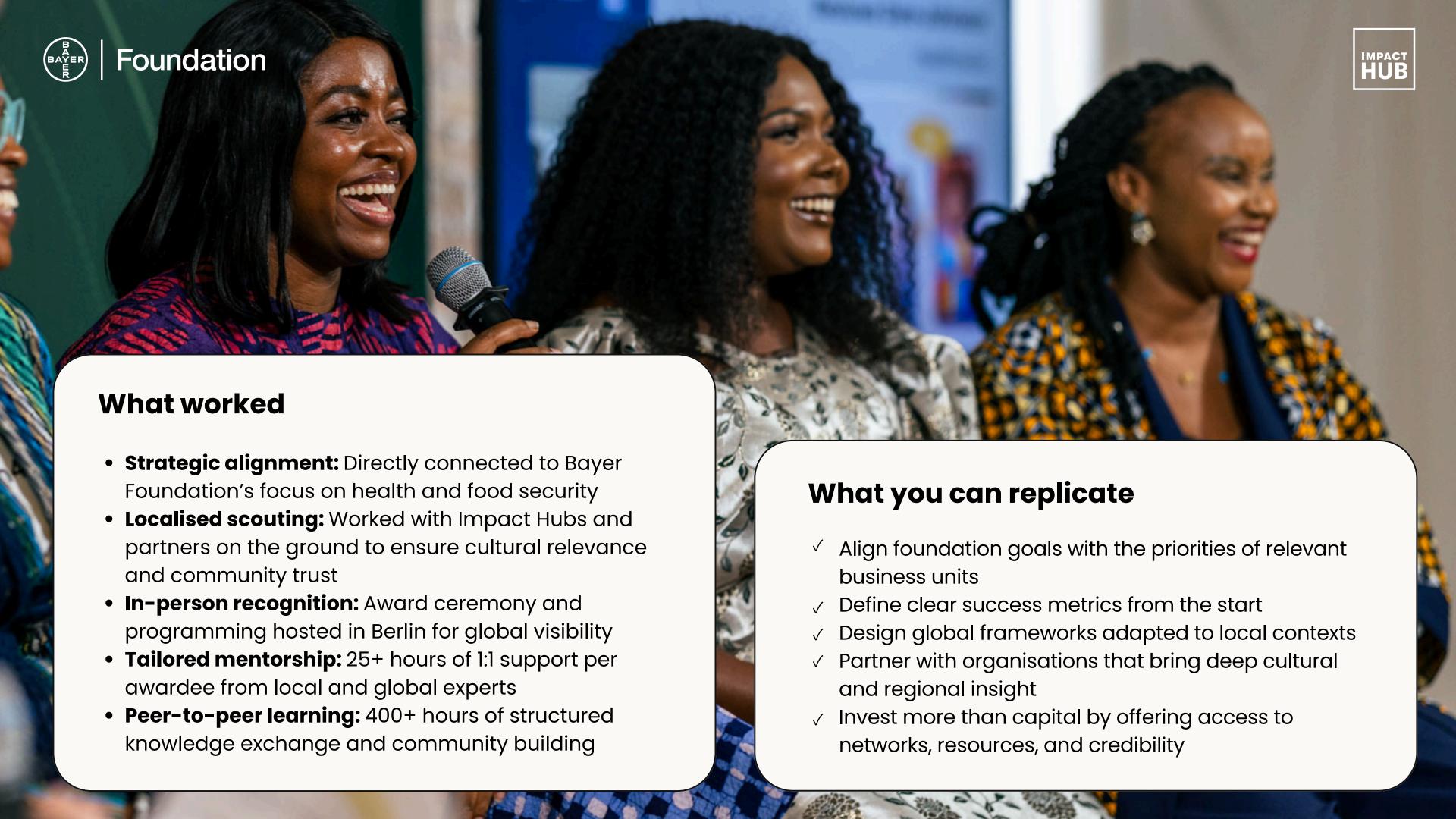

How do we innovate sustainably across a complex global supply chain?

IKEA partnered with Impact Hub Network to scout for circular economy solutions, focusing on specific supply chain challenges like sustainable foam and glue alternatives.

In 2023 and 2024, IKEA partnered with Impact Hub to pilot two groundbreaking innovation initiatives focused on sustainable materials. Through the Glue Program, the partnership sought pioneering innovators exploring the potential of bio-based board adhesives.

More recently, the IKEA Foam Collaboration called on innovators to replace fossil-based PU foam with bio- or recycled-foam solutions—themes central to IKEA's journey toward 100% renewable or recycled materials by 2030.

These programmes engaged global innovators through scoping and scouting, demonstrating how purpose-aligned partnerships can fuel circular innovation at scale—and help a retail leader reimagine materials for a sustainable future.

#### **What worked**

- **Global reach:** Leveraged 120+ Impact Hubs and specialised scouting teams to find global solutions
- **Fine-tuned collaboration:** Designed iterative engagement between innovators and IKEA teams to align expectations, adapt solutions, and ensure mutual learning
- Innovation + procurement alignment: Connected R&D goals with supply chain reality

#### What you can replicate

- Start with clear ROI and impact criteria for partnerships
- Use global networks for solution scouting
- Connect innovation with procurement from day one
- Focus on solutions that reduce costs <u>OR</u> increase revenue, not just impact



adidas partnered with Impact Hub Network to build and scale the Community Lab — a programme supporting BIPOC social entrepreneurs working to make sports more inclusive and accessible.

Originally piloted in Portland, the initiative has since expanded to five cities across North America, supporting 25 ventures and reaching more than 41,000 customers.

Participants gained access to funding, mentorship, and peer learning opportunities, with tailored support in areas such as branding, finance, and impact measurement.

This partnership reflects a powerful evolution in brand innovation—prioritising deep, authentic engagement that builds trust, drives long-term impact, and strengthens brand purpose through community-rooted action.

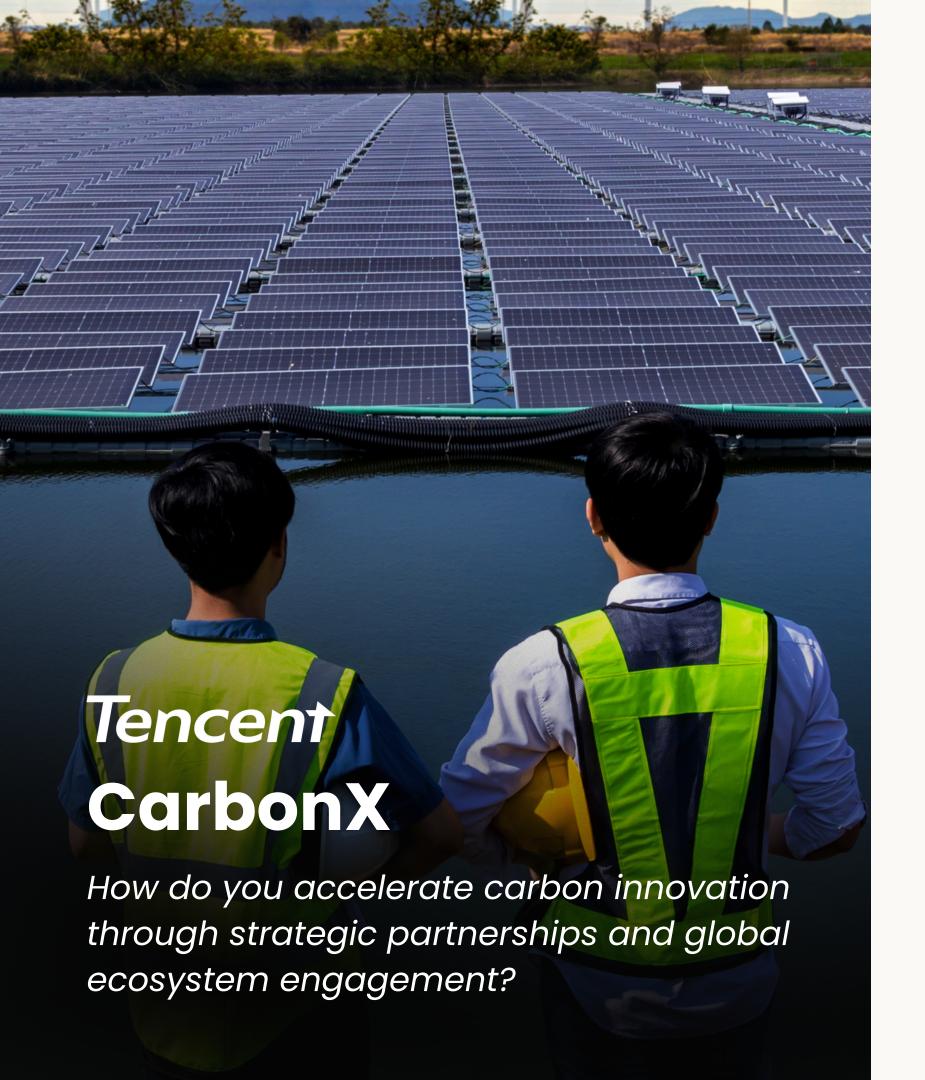


#### What worked

- **Co-creation at the core:** Developed with community voices, not just corporate strategy
- Place-based delivery: Locally rooted rollout across five North American cities
- **High-trust model:** Participants received funding plus hands-on support and visibility
- **Deep impact:** 150+ new business connections and 23 partnerships formed

#### What you can replicate

- √ Find natural intersection between your brand and community needs
- ✓ Design with lived experience at the center
- Treat communities as partners, not beneficiaries

- Use brand platforms to amplify community-led solutions and diverse voices
- √ Engage employees as mentors, not just volunteers



As part of Tencent's commitment to climate innovation, CarbonX Program 2.0 was launched to accelerate emerging low-carbon technologies with catalytic funding and global support.

Impact Hub led the strategic amplification and applicant outreach of the programme across five key markets, activating a dual-pronged approach: direct scouting through the Impact Hub network, and a global communications campaign amplified via trusted partners and social media.

This ensured both high-quality pipeline generation and widespread visibility among carbon innovation ecosystems.

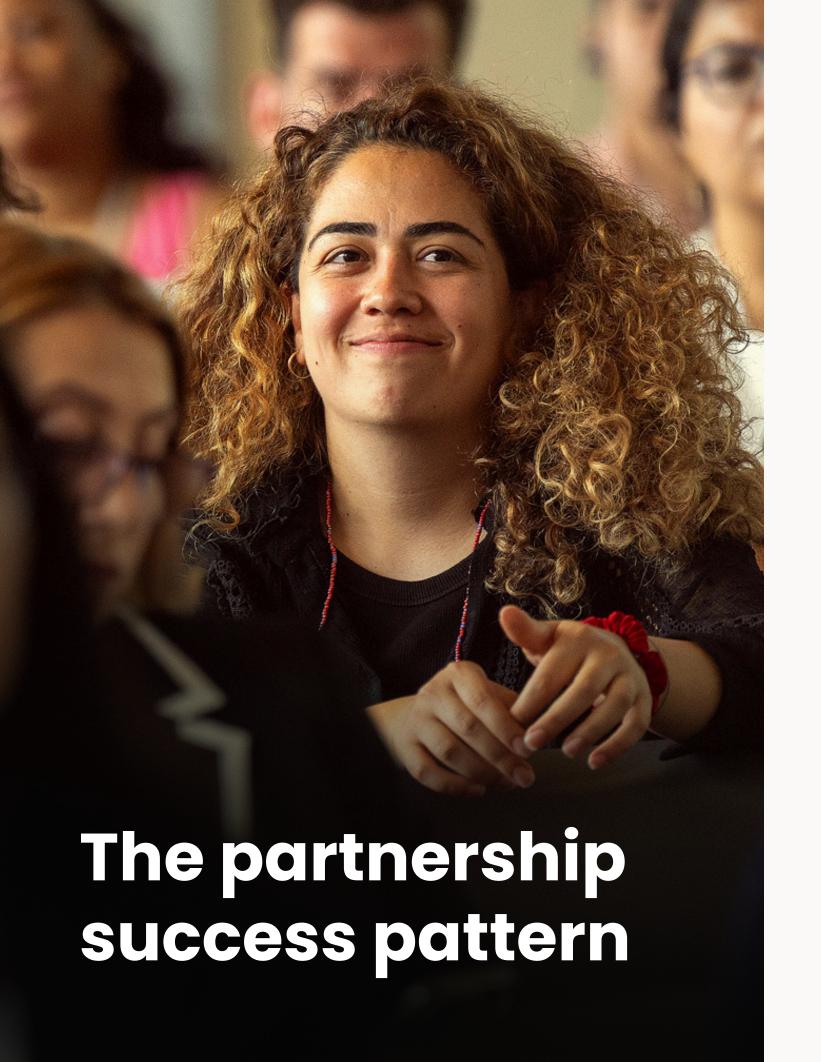
- **Strong thought leadership:** Served to position Tencent as a leading voice in carbon innovation
- **Direct outreach and scouting:** Direct, personal outreach by local Impact Hubs successfully converted high-potential leads into quality applications
- Continuous engagement: Global and regional Q&A sessions offered potential applicants the clarity and confidence they needed to join the programme

# A proven partnership pathway

There's no one-size-fits-all model for corporate sustainable innovation. But the partnerships that deliver lasting change tend to follow a common rhythm: grounded in community, designed for impact, and built to scale.

### Align with purpose

Set clear goals and design with local context in mind. Strong partnerships reflect internal priorities and realworld conditions.

### Structure for agility

Define KPIs, timelines, and budget. Choose flexible modules that match your ambition—whether launching, scaling, or evolving.

### Deliver with care

Scout, select, and support with care. Ensure strong coordination and stay agile with real-time feedback and learning loops.

### Learn and amplify

Track what matters. Use data to learn and storytelling to grow trust, visibility, and long-term momentum.

# Partnership readiness check

Before launching a new sinnovation initiative—or deepening an existing one—it's worth pausing to assess your internal alignment, capacity, and clarity.

#### Ask yourself:

- □ Do we have clear business objectives beyond "doing good"?
- □ Do we have internal champions to lead the initiative?
- □ Is there budget or resourcing allocated for the next phase of this work?
- □ Can we commit to a minimum of 6 months?
- □ Are we ready to measure both impact and business value from this initiative?
- □ Are we open to external partnerships, including grassroots and global solutions?
- □ Does this effort align with current leadership priorities or strategic plans?
- ✓ If you answered "yes" to three or more, you're ready to start a partnership conversation.
